Linda called 911 for help. The Foothill Division officers who responded to her call understood that they were being sent to rescue a woman being held against her will. And yet – as the critical incident video clearly shows – Linda was shot only because she perceived as a threat to the officer's own safety, while she was backing away in fear. By failing to provide even a semblance of oversight for countless prior instances of LAPD's institutional racism, transmisogyny, and sexual violence, this Commission is responsible for Linda's death.

Subsequent to Linda's death on February 27th of last year, LAPD took over a week to even acknowledge her death – which occurred at their hands, and while Linda was being held in their custody. LAPD treated Linda like a criminal from the first moment they made contact with her. As evidenced by LAPD's critical incident video (and despite LAPD's blatant effort to edit, redact, and misconstrue the events of that video), the officers engaged with her as if she was subhuman. They continued to yell orders at her in English, long after it was clear that she was a monolingual Spanish speaker; they grabbed at her head as if to examine her, then cursorily dismissed the possibility that she might be injured (needless to say, no specifically designated medical professional was present); they discussed the genital wounds she had sustained as a result of sexual assault in a tone of disgust, bordering on amusement; they displayed ongoing unconcern, if not impatience, with her obvious and extreme distress. In short, Linda spent the final minutes of her conscious life being tortured by these officers.

When Linda put a knife to her own throat with the intent to die by suicide, the cops made no attempt whatsoever to insure Linda's safety, or even to disarm her (if you can call holding a knife to one's own throat "armed" – specifically, a six-and-a-half-inch kitchen knife from which the sharp tip had been removed). These cowardly, bloodthirsty officers, trained not only in trauma-informed responses but also basic hand-to-hand combat, proceeded to back away from Linda, towards the door, until one of them shot into her chest from across the room. Following this lethal assault, the officers shouted at an immobilized, bleeding, and almost totally unconscious Linda to "calm down," and handcuffed her. They then continued to hold Linda hostage, guarding her in her room at Providence Holy Cross Medical Center. LAPD, along with its enablers in city government, treat survivors not as people in need of support, but as subhuman targets to terrorize and dispose of. It remains wholly unclear as to why an armed guard was required to protect the rest of the civilian populace from a woman who was unconscious, and on life support, upon entering the hospital on February 7th until her death on February 27th.

Despite obvious, objective evidence that officers wantonly gunned Linda down, and despite ongoing public outrage in the Police Commission meetings in the weeks and months following her death, this Board has yet to

make any meaningful acknowledgement of her death. We – the citizens whose voices you are supposed to represent – have no reason to expect anything from the BOPC beyond your violent, century-old tradition of silently rubber-stamping of LAPD's version of events. No reform could have saved Linda's life, and no justice can bring her back. But we can honor her by reminding the Board that you have her blood on her hands. You do not deserve to speak her name, let alone pay false compassionate lip service to her memory – still less to discuss the "legality" of her murder in anodyne terms, in closed session.

We remind the Board that your only course of action to save future lives is to defund and abolish LAPD: an organization whose purpose, in practice and intent, is to terrorize and disappear people like Linda – migrant folks, trans folks, unhoused folks, women of color – folks who were, and are, fiercely loved and remembered by their communities. We will never forget Linda. And we will continue to fight, forever, in her name.



I am addressing Agenda Item 6A, concerning the purported “employee performance evaluation” of Foothill Division officers implicated in the tragic sequence of events that ended with the death of Linda Becerra Moran on February 7, 2025. As a transgender, unhoused immigrant woman in desperate need, Linda dialed 911 seeking rescue from captivity and assault, only to face brutality, degradation, and fatal violence from LAPD personnel. Despite the department’s apparent attempts to alter, censor, sanitize, and distort the body-worn camera recordings, the footage unmistakably reveals officers treating her with profound inhumanity right from the outset—shouting commands in English despite clear evidence she spoke only Spanish, superficially checking her head injuries without medical expertise and quickly discounting them, casually and distastefully discussing her genital trauma from sexual assault, and showing persistent apathy, frustration, or detachment amid her visible agony and final moments of torment. In her profound despair, as she held a knife (its tip already broken off from a roughly six-and-a-half-inch kitchen blade) to her own throat in what appeared to be a suicide attempt, the officers offered no genuine attempt at de-escalation, disarming, protection, or emergency care; instead, they retreated in alarm, discharged their firearms, engaged in close-quarters combat until she was wounded, incapacitated, hemorrhaging, and unresponsive, then maintained armed surveillance over her at Providence Holy Cross Medical Center—restrained in handcuffs and regarded as a continuing danger rather than a victim requiring compassion. The LAPD withheld confirmation of her death for more than a week, even though it happened under their custody following extended life support, underscoring deep systemic shortcomings: absence of accountability for histories of racism, transmisogyny, and sexual misconduct; failure to apply crisis intervention for at-risk individuals; and deliberate efforts to suppress public backlash through delayed or manipulated video evidence at significant public cost. Public Comment: Agenda Item 6A /Los Angeles Board of Police Commissioners,

Los Angeles residents—regardless of identity or status—must be able to contact the police for help without fear of harm.

On February 7, 2025, Linda Becerra Moran contacted 911 during a moment of distress. Officers from the LAPD Foothill Division responded to a call reporting that a transgender woman was being held against her will.

Rather than assisting the victim, the responding officer perceived Linda Becerra Moran as the aggressor. Linda was shot by LAPD officers at the scene. She was then restrained and held under police guard while hospitalized at Providence Holy Cross Medical Center from February 7, 2025, until her death on February 27, 2025.

At no point should a person who calls 911 for help be treated as a threat instead of as a victim. The use of lethal force, the judgment exercised by responding officers, and the prolonged police custody during Ms. Becerra Moran’s hospitalization raise serious concerns that demand full transparency, accountability, and independent review.

If the LAPD is to serve the public, it must be held to standards that protect every Angeleno—especially those in crisis. When those standards fail, the consequences are not abstract. They are fatal. The public deserves clear answers as to how a request for emergency assistance resulted in the death of the person seeking help.

While public attention may fade as headlines move on, advocates and community members do not forget. Accountability does not expire with the news cycle. To date, the Commission has not held officers accountable in this case, and that failure deepens public mistrust.

Accordingly, I call on the Commission to take concrete action, including a full and independent review by the Inspector General; a public Commission hearing; the release of all relevant body-worn camera footage and records; a review and revision of LAPD crisis-response policies; and appropriate discipline, up to and including removal, for any officers found to have violated policy or the public trust.

Absent meaningful accountability, assurances of reform ring hollow. Los Angeles residents deserve a police department—and a Commission—willing to act when lives are lost. Thank you for allowing me to provide commentary.

As evidenced by LAPD's critical incident video (despite LAPD's blatant efforts to edit, redact, and misconstrue the events of that video), the officers engaged with her as if she was subhuman. They continued to yell orders at her in English, long after it was clear that she was a monolingual Spanish speaker; they grabbed at her head as if to examine her, then cursorily dismissed the possibility that she might be injured (needless to say, no qualified medical professional was present; the officers had no right within the scope of their duty to touch her in that way); they discussed the genital wounds she had sustained as a result of sexual assault with disgust, bordering on amusement; they displayed ongoing impatience with her obvious and extreme distress. In short, Linda spent the final minutes of her conscious life being tortured by the callousness of these officers.

When Linda put a knife to her own throat with the intent to die by suicide, the cops made no attempt whatsoever to insure Linda's safety, or even to disarm her (if you can call holding a knife to one's own throat "armed"). These cowardly, bloodthirsty officers, trained to the tune of billions of dollars not only in trauma-informed responses but also basic hand-to-hand combat, proceeded to back away from Linda, towards the door, until one of them shot into her chest from across the room. Following this lethal assault, the officers shouted at an immobilized, bleeding, and almost totally unconscious Linda to "calm down," and handcuffed her. They then continued to hold Linda hostage, guarding her in her room at Providence Holy Cross Medical Center. It remains wholly unclear as to why an armed guard was required to protect the rest of the civilian populace from a woman who was unconscious, and on life support, upon entering the hospital on February 7th until her death on February 27th.

It shouldn't need to be said - but it apparently needs to be said that this is all entirely inhuman and unacceptable behavior for employees of the city whose sole job is to protect and serve its citizens.

We demand the following:

- THE RELEASE OF THE FULL, UNEDITED BODY CAM FOOTAGE OF EVERY OFFICER, and
- THE RELEASE OF THE FULL, UNEDITED 911 TAPE.

Despite obvious, objective evidence that officers had summarily executed Linda, and despite ongoing public outrage in the Police Commission meetings in the weeks and months following her death, this Board has yet to make any meaningful acknowledgement of her death or take any corrective action to address the officers whose obvious and verifiable failure to act within their duty has stained our city and, again, the reputation of the LAPD.

No reform could have saved Linda's life, and no justice can bring her back. But we can honor her by reminding the Board that you have her blood on her hands, and the officers responsible for her execution - which, again, ignores the billions of dollars in de-escalation training that all police officers receive - should be dismissed immediately for their utter failure in the line of duty. This is absolutely inexcusable.

We remind the Board that your only course of action to save future lives is to defund and abolish the LAPD: an organization whose widely-documented actions do not "protect and serve" but rather terrorize and disappear people like Linda - migrant folks, trans folks, unhoused folks, women of color - all citizens of our city, and all people who were, and are, fiercely loved and remembered by their communities.

Dear LAPD Police Commissioners,

Voices For LAPD continues to advocate for the effective implementation of community policing, enhanced communication between officers and residents, and improved public safety for all.

The LAPD faces critical challenges regarding hiring, recruitment, and retention. With the most recent academy class graduating only 21 recruits against a goal of 60, significant improvement is necessary. We urge the Police Commission, the Mayor, and Chief McDonnell to prioritize leadership that restores meritocracy and improves morale. Additionally, we recommend updating the [LAPDONLINE.ORG](https://www.lapdonline.org) website to focus on professional police work rather than social identity signaling.

Regarding recruitment barriers, we ask if COVID-19 vaccination is still mandatory for academy entrants. If so, we believe this requirement should be abolished to prevent discrimination against unvaccinated applicants and expand the recruitment pool.

Furthermore, we call for the immediate suspension of the unarmed crisis response team program. Responding to calls involving mental illness, intoxication, and disturbances is inherently dangerous. These situations can escalate faster than armed backup can arrive, and we must prioritize the safety of responders to avoid preventable tragedies.

While the LAPD manages field operations, the rest of the criminal justice system must ensure that criminal acts carry serious consequences. Transparency is essential; we request that the City Attorney and District Attorney hold public meetings to remain accountable to the community.

We support seamless collaboration between local, state, and federal law enforcement. Specifically, the LAPD should facilitate the peaceful transfer of criminal illegal aliens to ICE within secure detention environments. Furthermore, leadership must clearly define the boundaries of peaceful protest and ensure that those who obstruct, interfere with, or assault law enforcement officers—including ICE and HSI agents—face arrest and federal charges.

Restoring the rule of law through consistent enforcement and inter-agency cooperation will result in a safer, more harmonious city for everyone.
