

**SUBJECT: RELEASE NOTIFICATION OF PERSONS CONVICTED OF CERTAIN
SEX OFFENSES AGAINST MINORS**

PURPOSE: Senate Bill 1199 added Section 3058.9 to the California Penal Code. Section 3058.9 requires the Department of Corrections (DOC) to notify the Department of an individual's release from prison when that individual was convicted within the City's jurisdiction of a specific child abuse offense, or any sex offense identified in statutory law as being perpetrated against a minor victim. Currently, the Department receives written notification from the DOC of persons convicted of violent felonies who are scheduled for release. This Notice will not affect current notification procedures.

PROCEDURE: Pursuant to Section 3058.9 of the California Penal Code, the DOC will provide the Department written notification regarding the release of persons convicted of a specific child abuse offense, or any sex offense identified in statutory law as being perpetrated against a minor victim. Upon receipt, Records and Identification (R&I) Division shall forward the notice to the Operations Support Division (OSD) in the Area that the crime occurred. This notification shall include the name of the person who is scheduled to be released, whether or not the person is required to register with local law enforcement, and the community in which the person will reside. This information may be used as an investigative resource by the OSD.

This notification procedure shall be consistent with R&I Division's current notification procedures for individuals convicted of violent felonies committed within the City and scheduled for release.

OPERATIONAL NOTICE NO. 2

SUBJECT: SEX OFFENDER REGISTRATION CRITERIA-REVISED

PURPOSE: In September of 1999, California State Assembly Bill 1193 amended Sections 290, 290.5, and 4852.03 of the California Penal Code. The amendments delineate additional criteria for the registration of convicted sex offenders by Department personnel assigned to Operations Support Division, Major Assault Crime (MAC) units. This Notice identifies the additional registration criteria for convicted sex offenders and amends Office of Operations Order No. 27, 1995.

PROCEDURE: In addition to existing procedures regarding the registration of sex offenders, MAC unit personnel shall register convicted sex offenders who are employed in the State of California on a full or part-time basis for more than 14 consecutive days, an aggregate of 30 days in a calendar year, or when enrolled in an educational institution. As part of the registration process, a convicted sex offender is required to:


* Register his/her address and place of employment or school;

Note: A registrant located at one or more than one address or location must register with each law enforcement agency in each jurisdiction of all the addresses or locations.

* Verify his/her address no less than once every 90 days when the sex offender has been adjudicated as a violent sexual predator; and,

* Register as a sex offender for the rest of his/her life when the offender has been convicted of a misdemeanor violation of annoying or molesting a child.

OPERATIONAL NOTICE NO. 3

March 1, 2001

SUBJECT: DEPLOYMENT OF BUREAU COMMAND POST VEHICLES

EFFECTIVE: IMMEDIATELY

PURPOSE: The Department purchased several Bureau Command Post Vehicles (BCPV's) for deployment in each geographic bureau. The BCPV's are multi-functional and capable of handling single or multi-agency command incidents. The vehicles were designed and tested for use during small to moderate size field incidents and are each equipped with a notebook computer, cellular telephone, fax machine, digital camera, and flat screen television. These items were included to assist the incident commander with managing a field incident. This Notice deploys a BCPV to a designated Area within each geographic bureau.

PROCEDURE:

I. BUREAU COMMAND POST VEHICLE DEPLOYMENT. The following locations have been designated for the initial deployment of a BCPV:

- * Operations-Central Bureau - Central Area;
- * Operations-West Bureau - West Los Angeles Area;
- * Operations-South Bureau - Seventy-Seventh Street Area; and,
- * Operations-Valley Bureau - Van Nuys Area.

Note: Equipment shall not be removed from any BCPV.

II. GEOGRAPHIC BUREAU COMMANDING OFFICER'S RESPONSIBILITY. Geographic bureau commanding officers shall:

- * Ensure Area commanding officers establish a cadre of officers who are trained in the operation of the BCPV;
- * Ensure the BCPV's are available for response to all Areas within the bureau;
- * Ensure the BCPV's are equipped with the required State administrative forms listed on the Incident Command System Checklist;
- * Ensure requests for repair of the BCPV's electronic equipment are forwarded to the appropriate entity for repair;
- * Ensure requests for repair of the BCPV's cellular telephone are forwarded to Facilities Management Division; and,

March 1, 2001

- * Ensure regular maintenance checks of the BCPV's are completed by the Area garage.

III. UNIFORMED SUPPORT DIVISION RESPONSIBILITY. Uniformed Support Division (USD) personnel shall provide BCPV training as requested. Additionally, USD shall conduct periodic audits of the BCPV's to determine compliance with this Notice.




SUBJECT: PRISONER RELEASE - NO PROBABLE CAUSE DETERMINATION (PCD)

PURPOSE: The Department has identified specific areas of police work that have the greatest potential for exposing the City to civil liability. Detentions and arrests are recognized as two of these high-risk situations. Prevention strategies have been developed in an effort to reduce the City's legal exposure and hold Department employees more accountable in this area. Jail Division has developed a notification procedure via the use of an Intradepartmental Correspondence, Form 15.2, to advise commanding officers when an arrestee's release from custody is due to probable cause irregularities.

PROCEDURE: Jail Division shall specify on a Form 15.2 the reason for an arrestee's unscheduled release as either "PCD Not Received" or a magistrate's finding that no probable cause existed. The Form 15.2 shall then be forwarded by the Commanding Officer, Jail Division, to the involved officer's commanding officer.

Commanding officers shall take appropriate action (training, complaint investigation, etc.) when notified of a prisoner's release, due to either a missing PCD form or an officer's failure to recognize or articulate adequate probable cause.

SUBJECT: DEPARTMENT PROTOCOL FOR FILING CASES OF CRIMES AGAINST THE ELDERLY, HATE CRIMES, CRIMES OF SEXUAL ABUSE, STALKING, AND DOMESTIC VIOLENCE.

PURPOSE: The Los Angeles District Attorney's Office has implemented the Victim Impact Program (VIP) to more effectively prosecute crimes against the elderly, hate crimes, crimes of sexual abuse, stalking, and domestic violence. This program is designed to facilitate the vertical prosecution of cases in the above categories. The District Attorney's Office has designated VIP coordinators in branch and area offices throughout the County who will assign cases from the targeted categories to specific Deputy District Attorneys.

PROCEDURE: Effective immediately, an investigating officer filing a case for a crime against the elderly, a hate crime, a crime of sexual abuse, stalking, or domestic violence shall contact the coordinator serving his/her Area from the attached list. The coordinator will assign a Deputy District Attorney with expertise in these areas to vertically handle the case from filing through sentencing. This process will not only streamline the filing process, but will benefit the victim.

**SUBJECT: THE USE OF AVAILABLE PERSONNEL AT UNUSUAL OCCURRENCES
AND SPECIAL EVENTS**

The Department's mission when responding to the scene of unusual occurrences and special events involving large crowds is to restore and maintain public order, protect life, protect vital facilities, arrest violators, and to protect property. Incident Commanders are encouraged to deploy **all** officers at unusual occurrences and special events, as soon as necessary, especially those where riotous activity is imminent.

As stated in the LAPD Emergency Operations Guide (EOG), Volume 5, *Guidelines for Crowd Management and Crowd Control*, the early moments of a civil disorder are critical. The rapid mobilization and deployment of police resources is a visual representation of the Department's firm commitment to maintaining peace. This display of police resolve, coupled with orders for the crowd to disperse, will often result in the prevention and/or quelling of the disorder without actually employing further measures. This includes having sufficient personnel to staff the requisite Incident Command System positions, including that of Staging Area Manager.

Incident Commanders should not hold available personnel in reserve until some measure of containment and control has been achieved and sufficient personnel have been assigned to all of the primary operational missions necessary to resolve the problem.

For further information regarding the Department's procedures for managing unusual occurrences and special events that involve large crowds, consult the Department's Emergency Operations Guide, Volume 5, *Guidelines for Crowd Management and Crowd Control*, and Volume 2, *Supervisor's Field Operations Guide*.
