SUBJECT: IMPLEMENTATION OF THE SEXUAL ASSAULT VICTIM'S RIGHTS

CARD (PENAL CODE 680.2 PROCEDURES)

Assembly Bill (AB)1312, Sexual Assault Victims: Rights, includes procedural changes to sexual assault crime response by law enforcement, as well as changes and additions in procedures by medical providers and prosecutors. On October 12, 2017, AB 1312 was signed into law amending Penal Code Section 680, by adding subsection 680.2.

This Notice applies to Penal Code Section 680.2, stating that law enforcement will provide sexual assault victims with a card informing them of their rights as victims of a sexual assault crime.

PROCEDURES

OFFICERS' RESPONSIBILITIES: I.

Officers completing any Sexual Assault Crime Investigative Report (IR) or combined crime/arrest report will ensure that a LAPD 680.2 PC Card was provided to the victim of the sexual assault. Officers shall document if the card was provided to the victim by officers, or by other means, such as the medical provider.

Officers shall document that the victim of a sexual assault was provided with the 680.2 PC Card by checking the "680.2 PC Card Provided" box, as listed on the Request for Confidentiality of Information report, LAPD Form 3.02.00, or by documenting the information in the "Additional" heading of any crime/arrest report.

WATCH COMMANDERS' RESPONSIBILITIES: II.

When reviewing any crime or arrest report related to a sexual assault, watch commanders shall ensure that the reporting officer(s) made the proper documentation that the 680.2 PC Card was provided to the victim of the sexual assault.

If the 680.2 PC Card was not provided to the victim, the watch commander will ensure one is provided by mail, e-mail, or fax and ensure that proper documentation is completed on the Request for Confidentiality of Information, Form 3.02.00, or in the "Additional" heading of any crime or arrest report.

III. AREA AND SPECIALIZED DETECTIVES' RESPONSIBILITIES:

Area and specialized detectives will verify that if a 680.2 PC Card was not provided to the victim during the initial contact, one is provided during the follow up investigation and documented on the Follow-up Investigation Report, Form 03.14.00.

IV. COMMANDING OFFICERS' RESPONSIBILITIES:

Commanding Officers will ensure that patrol, detective, or administrative personnel provide the 680.2 PC Card to all sexual assault crime victims.

V. REQUEST FOR CONFIDENTIALITY OF INFORMATION, FORM 03.02.00 - REVISED:

The Request for Confidentiality of Information, Form 03.02.00, has been revised to reflect a check box indicting "680.2 PC Card Provided." When a victim of a sexual assault crime has been provided with a 680.2 PC Card, the reporting officer, supervisor, or detective will check this box, or document it in the "Additional" heading of the IR/ Arrest Report.

FORM AVAILABILTY: The 680.2 PC Card, in both English and in Spanish, is available on the Department's LAPD Forms and at Supply Section, Fiscal Operations Division. The revised Request for Confidentiality of Information Form 03.02.00, is available on the Department's LAN, under *LAPD Forms*.

Old versions of the Request for Confidentiality of Information, Form 03.02.00 that do not contain the "680.2 PC Card Provided" box may be used to document that the 680.2 PC Card was provided to the victim when 680.2 PC documentation is provided in the "Other" box on the Request for Confidentiality of Information, Form 03.02.00, "Additional" heading of the crime or arrest report.

RIGHTS AS A SEXUAL ASSAULT VICTIM

This pamphlet explains your rights as a victim of sexual assault. Even If you decide not to participate in the criminal justice system, file a police report, have a medical exam to collect evidence of the assault, you will still have these rights.

SUPPORT AVAILABLE FOR YOU

You have the right to have a sexual assault counselor and at least one more person of your choosing, to provide you support during:

- the initial medical evidentiary exam;
- 2) the physical exam; and
- the investigative interview with law enforcement, prosecutors, defense attorneys, and/or their agents about the assault.

FINANCIAL HELP

You may be able to get financial help for medical and other costs associated with the sexual assault through compensation funds from the California Victim Compensation Board at http://www.victims.ca.gov, or call 1-800-777-9229, the Bureau of Victim's Services, Los Angeles District Attorney's Office at http://www.da.lacounty.gov/victims, or call 1-800 380-3811, as well as the Federal Office for Victims of Crime at https://ovc.ncjrs.gov.

If a criminal trial occurs, the court may order the convicted person to pay restitution to you. See your investigating officer or District Attorney's Office for assistance.

TESTING SEXUAL ASSAULT KITS

DNA evidence degrades over time. A timely response to a Sexual Assault Response Team (SART) facility to collect DNA evidence can increase the possibility to identify and prosecute an offender. Once your sexual assault evidence kit is in custody, the evidence will be processed for analysis and completed within 2 years. The status of your Sexual Assault Evidence Kit (SAEK) can be provided to you by the investigating officer or their detective supervisor. Law enforcement may provide you with information regarding whether a DNA profile was obtained, uploaded, and/or matched.

The Los Angeles Police Department will keep the sexual assault forensic evidence for an unsolved case for at least 20 years, or if you were under 18 years of age at the time of the alleged offense, the forensic evidence will be kept at least until the victim's 40th birthday.

Rape and sexual violence can come in many forms. Rape or sexual assault can happen any time you are forced to have sex(including vaginal anal, or oral) or have unwanted sexual contact of any kind (including touching). It can happen even when you know or have a relationship with the offender.

SERVICES AVAILABLE TO YOU

Depending on your circumstances, different types of law enforcement resources may be available to you, including:

A Domestic Violence Restraining Order or a Temporary Restraining Order (TRO), which orders a household member, close relative, or other person, to stay away from you, is available through the court system.

An Emergency Protective Order, which can be requested through the LAPD can order the perpetrator to stay away from you for up to seven days.

A Criminal Protective or Stay-Away Order, which orders the defendant in a criminal case to stay away from you, is available through the court system.
