Course Goal: To provide the students with the basic skills necessary to complete a thorough Domestic Violence investigation, utilizing current law and department policy.

Learning Objectives:

- Recognize procedures for seizing firearms or other deadly weapons [25.III.D]
- The student will participate in a Learning Activity relating to proper response to a domestic violence incident to include: [25.VII.A] Felony arrests, [25.VII.A.1] Misdemeanor arrests, [25.VII.A.2] Use of citizen arrests, [25.VII.A.3] Verification and enforcement of temporary restraining orders when the suspect is present and when the suspect has fled, [25.VII.A.4] Verification and enforcement of stay-away orders, [25.VII.A.5] Cite and release policies, [25.VII.A.6] Emergency assistance to victims to include medical care, transportation to a shelter, and law enforcement standbys for the removal of personal property, [25.VII.A.7] Assistance to victims in pursuing criminal options to include giving the report number and directing the victim to the proper investigative unit, [25.VII.A.8] Providing information card with local resources to victims at the scene. [25.VII.A.9]
