

THE SIX PROTECTED CLASSES UNDER THE CALIFORNIA HATE CRIME LAW ARE:



The City of Los Angeles has a unique and culturally diverse population. Its residents represent nearly every culture, nationality, race, and religion onearth. This diversity has significantly contributed to making Los Angeles the vibrant and dynamic City it is today. There are people and groups who commit crimes and acts against members of specific groups. These crimes and acts are called "Hate Crimes" and "Hate Incidents."

It is important to know the facts about hate crimes and hate incidents. Knowing the facts places the community in a better position to recognize hate crimes and hate incidents as a very serious community problem.

HATE INCIDENTS

A hate incident is any noncriminal action or behavior motivated by bias, but legally protected by the First Amendment right to freedom of expression.

Examples of hate incidents include:

- Epithets.
- Distribution of hate material in public places.
- Posting of hate material that does not result in property damage.
- The display of offensive material on one'sown property.

The U.S. Constitution allows hate speech as long as it does not interfere with the civil rights of others. If a hate incident starts to threaten a person or property, it may become a hate crime.

HATE CRIMES

A hate crime is any criminal act or attempt act, directed against a person(s), public agency, or private institution based on the victim's actual or perceived: -race, nationality, or ethnicity -religion, -sexual orientation, -disability, -gender, -or because the victim, agency, or institution is identified or associated with a person or group of with one or more of these protected characterics.

Examples of hate crimes include:

- Acts that result in injury,
- Threats of violence,
- Vandalism and other destructive acts,
- Harassment, including anonymous telephone calls, threatening letters, and interruptions of religious services.
- Threats made verbally, in writing, and by means of electronic communication devices
- Murder.

HOW TO SPOT A HATE CRIME:

Here are signs of a possible hate crime:

- The criminal chose the victim or property because they belonged to a protected group, like a certain religion or gender.
- The criminal made written or verbal comments showing a prejudice.
- The crime happened on a date that is important for the victim's protected group.
- There is a lot of organized hate activity in the area.

IF YOU ARE A VICTIM OF A HATE CRIME

- Contact the local police or sheriff right away!

- Get medical attention (if you need it).
- Write down the exact words that were said.
- Make notes about any other facts so you don't forget them.
- Save all evidence (e.g., graffiti, egg shells, writing on victim's vehicle). If safe, wait until law enforcement arrives and takes photos.
- Get the names, addresses, phone numbers, and emails of other victims and witnesses.
- Try to get a description from any eyewitnesses of the criminal or the vehicle.

• Call community organiZations in your area that respond to hate crimes.
