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Good morning, Police Commissioners, I hope everyone is doing well. I wanted to welcome the new Police Commissioners, Rasha Shields and Dr. Erroll Southers. I would like to start with a quote from Ian Watson, "If you have to be persuaded, reminded, pressured, lied to, incentivized, coerced, bullied, socially shamed, guilt-tripped, threatened, punished and criminalized; If all of this is considered necessary to gain your compliance- You can be absolutely certain that what is being promoted is not in your best interest".

I was truly hoping the Police Commission would have given their feedback as to how each one of you applies the Core Values that are posted on your webpage. I was hoping those words would resonate with you. My suggestion for you all to read and reflect on these Core Values just fell through the cracks apparently. If you are serious about changing culture, it starts with you.

During the last Police Commission meeting on 3/21/2023 if you listened, I could not have proven the words that I have been saying for the past several months to be truer. All the speakers that bravely spoke all had one thing in common, they don't trust you. This is truly a pandemic of corruption within the City of Los Angeles leadership. Honestly, how do you realistically think anything is ever going to change when you continue down this same path week after week?

Commissioner Briggs I'm very disappointed with you. I have continued to ask, why you provided a false narrative to the public to justify extending the state of emergency when the Covid-19 trends at the time of your briefing did not match the data you provided. The truth can always be easily defended; however, your silence is deafening, and your lack of response says a lot. I will give you the benefit of doubt, maybe you don't recall the meeting that I'm referring to. You can refresh your memory and watch the Police Commission meeting on the internet. The dates that I'm referring to are 9/20/22 and 10/25/22.

Let me provide further detail below that provides dates and the current data for that time period.

On 9/2/2022, the CDC moved LA County into the low Community level for severe illness from Covid-19. Reflecting minimal stress on the hospital systems in LA County associated with Covid-19. Per the CDC many people in the U.S. have some protection, or immunity, against Covid-19. This immunity, combined with the availability of tests and treatments, has greatly reduced the risk of severe illness, hospitalizations, and death from the Covid-19 for many people.

On 9/20/2022, During agenda item #3 AB361, Commissioner Briggs advised, the state of emergency remain active because of increased Covid cases, increased hospitalizations, and death. These cases have increased from one month prior and continue to pose an imminent risk to health. Commissioner Briggs used data from the L.A. County Health Department from July 7, 2022. The CDC published updated Covid-19 data eighteen days prior to this Police Commission meeting. Commission Briggs was not providing the public with the current trends.

On October 17, 2022, Governor Newsom published a report from his official webpage, noting hospitalizations and deaths are dramatically reduced and California has the tools needed to continue fighting Covid-19. Governor Newsom even added he has built up an unprecedented public health infrastructure.

On October 25, 2022, Commissioner Briggs during the Police Commission meeting read from his computer screen the same verbiage as he did on 9/20/22 to extend the state of emergency, using data from the L.A. County Health Department from July 7, 2022. As you can see from the CDC and what was posted on the official webpage of Governor Newsom there is a wide discrepancy with the verbiage Commissioner Briggs used.

If we were still in July, when Commissioner Briggs read this on 9/20/22 & 10/25/22, I would be in complete agreement with him that Covid cases were up. As you all are aware in the month of July 2022, per Chief Moore, there were a total of 405 Covid-19 positive infections within the LAPD, 323 of the 405 were fully vaccinated, meaning for the month of July, 80% of the positive cases came from the vaccinated population within the LAPD.

If we were still in August, when Commissioner Briggs read this on 9/20/22 & 10/25/22, I would still agree with him that Covid cases were up. As you all are aware in the month of August 2022, per Chief Moore there were a total of 317 Covid-19 positive infections within the LAPD, 262 of the 317 were fully vaccinated, meaning for the month of August, 83% of the positive cases came from the vaccinated population within the LAPD.

I'm not sure if the citizens of Los Angeles are aware of this. The City of Los Angeles receives money every time the state of emergency is extended. The Police Commission extended the state of emergency to continue to allow for virtual meetings under a false pretense, however City Council extended the state of emergency for profit, under a false pretense. If conditions of a state of emergency aren't met, continuing to declare a state of emergency still exists from obsolete Covid-19 data when it doesn't match the current trends is FRAUD! Inspector General where is the investigation?

On 11/22/22 during the Police Commission meeting, Commissioner Briggs extended the state of emergency once again under the clever disguise of agenda item #3, Teleconference meeting. This is just one example of many why there is a severe lack of public trust with you all. As all of you are aware, for November 2022, there were a total of 166 Covid-19 infections within LAPD. 140 of those infections were from the vaccinated population within the LAPD.

I want to point out an article written by Joseph Mercola that was published on March 20, 2023. In this article it points out the surge in deaths and disability that has occurred since the Covid-19 shot campaign rolled out.

Disability numbers Skyrocketed! Prior to the Covid-19 shots there were 29 to 30 million disabled people on an absolute basis, a rate that remained steady for four or five years. In 2021, a trend changed, occurring reaching a high of 33.2 million in September of 2022, with numbers trending upward. This trend of change that is happening is highly unusual.

Insurance companies that sell group life policies to large Fortune 500 corporations have seen a 40% surge in deaths. These companies thrive on selling policies to these types of companies because they hardly ever pay out on a claim. The workers at these corporations tend to be in good health, with industry data suggesting the group life policyholders have one-third the mortality rate of the general U.S. population. These death rates have historically been highly predictable among this group.

Steve Kirsch also provided insight to this article. Kirsch wrote, the data showing among the vaccinated with the Covid-19 shot aged 65 and younger, sudden death was the No.1 cause of death in 2021 and 2022. The second highest cause of death was cardiac-related death and cancer was the third. The incidence of turbo-charged cancer among the vaccinated was significant in this group and myocarditis has killed more people than Covid-19. No myocarditis deaths were seen

among unvaccinated people in the same age group.

You can also read another article titled, “Scientific and Public Health Failure” that was posted in my public comment on 2/28/23 and 3/14/23. This article was published on 2/07/23 by the Daily Caller written by Dylan Housman.

Chief Moore mentioned there are still 11 “Long Covid Cases” during the Police Commission meeting on 03/21/23. Can you please define what Long Covid Cases means? Are you referring to adverse events with the Covid-19 gene therapy shot or are you referring to what the CDC Deputy Director Tom Shimabukuro admitted to that Covid-19 vaccines are causing “Debilitating Illnesses” and “We are aware of these reports of people experiencing long-lasting health problems following Covid vaccination.” I’m not requesting the names of the LAPD personnel, just a definition as to the meaning of “Long Covid Cases”. The term “Long Covid Cases” has been used for the past several months and it’s unclear. How would one know if symptoms are from long term side effects of taking part in a clinical trial, never tested on humans before or from “Long Covid”? I would imagine it would be hard to tell since long flu wasn’t in the public consciousness via the media before.

Chief Moore or Mayor Bass would one of you be able to elaborate on the City of Los Angeles definition of being “fully vaccinated”? How many employees are up to date with Covid-19 boosters per the CDC and FDA recommendations? The reason why I ask is the CDC is showing 16.4% of the population in the United States are up to date with their Covid-19 boosters. You can view and verify this on the CDC website. Using the CDC’s 16.4% as a guide, if one applies this to the Police Commission that means only 1 out of 5 of you is up to date with their Covid-19 boosters. This would also mean that only 3 people of all the City Council plus Mayor Bass are up to date with their Covid-19 boosters. This would...

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Commissioners,

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LAPD continues to lead the nation in the number of people killed by police annually. The department also continues to protect its shooters, producing and releasing carefully scripted and edited videos of police murders and brutality, which set the police narrative months before any formal investigation. These videos are filled with misinformation and lies, and are funded through the city budget.

The tactic of selectively constructing and publishing analyses about police “use of force” - which today takes the form of LAPD’s Annual Use of Force Report, on the agenda today - emerged in 2014 as a state and police response to nationwide uprisings and outrage over the murders of Ezell Ford and Mike Brown, two Black youth who were only among the most recent to have been murdered by police.

As communities demanded an end to police murders, police departments including LAPD responded by performatively committing to invest in increased police “transparency,” data-gathering, and reporting regarding its own “use of force.” Like the increased focus on RIPA stop data, these commitments ring hollow as the community understands that none of this will lead to less racialized violence or police “use of force.”

Police continue to lie in LAPD reports. Critical Incident videos show false narratives and an institutional and social culture of dehumanization and violence. LAPD has published these bloated annual reports since 2015, filled with tables that will never be referred to and are of no use to the community; the reports stuffed with descriptions of policies and procedures that police routinely ignore. In the 2021 Annual Use of Force Report we read how police are prohibited from

shooting from a moving vehicle - in 2022 LAPD Sergeant Brett Hayhoe fired from a moving vehicle at Jermaine Petite, badly wounding him.

In other issues LAPD describes all the ways it claims to train cops to de-escalate and use "less lethal" force, but still in 2021, 2022, and present day, LAPD continues to respond to calls for help from people in crisis and fatally shoot them, as they did with Margarito Lopez Jr. and Jesus Alan Castellanos.

These are some of the many policies and trainings that gets presented in the Annual Use of Force Reports. These reports do not accurately report on LAPD nor do they decrease police violence. We further demand to be able to give public comment following agenda items, including an LAPD presentation. In previous years, prior to COVID-19, the community was able to provide comment after hearing more information about an agenda item. This has been eliminated so there is no opportunity for community members to speak on presentations. This must be reversed as the community is the most informed when it comes to the treatment of community members by police, and the overall actions of police.

Good morning, Police Commissioners, I hope everyone is doing well. I wanted to welcome the new Police Commissioners, Rasha Shields and Dr. Erroll Southers. I would like to start with a quote from Ian Watson, **“If you have to be persuaded, reminded, pressured, lied to, incentivized, coerced, bullied, socially shamed, guilt-tripped, threatened, punished and criminalized; If all of this is considered necessary to gain your compliance- You can be absolutely certain that what is being promoted is not in your best interest”**.

I was truly hoping the Police Commission would have given their feedback as to how each one of you applies the Core Values that are posted on your webpage. I was hoping those words would resonate with you. My suggestion for you all to read and reflect on these Core Values just fell through the cracks apparently. If you are serious about changing culture, it starts with you.

During the last Police Commission meeting on 3/21/2023 if you listened, I could not have proven the words that I have been saying for the past several months to be truer. All the speakers that bravely spoke all had one thing in common, they don't trust you. This is truly a pandemic of corruption within the City of Los Angeles leadership. Honestly, how do you realistically think anything is ever going to change when you continue down this same path week after week?

Commissioner Briggs I'm very disappointed with you. I have continued to ask, why you provided a false narrative to the public to justify extending the state of emergency when the Covid-19 trends at the time of

your briefing did not match the data you provided. The truth can always be easily defended; however, your silence is deafening, and your lack of response says a lot. I will give you the benefit of the doubt; maybe you don't recall the meeting that I'm referring to. You can watch the Police Commission meetings on the internet. The dates that I'm referring to are 9/20/22 and 10/25/22.

I want to point out an article written by Joseph Mercola that was published on March 20, 2023. In this article it points out the surge in deaths and disability that has occurred since the Covid-19 shot campaign rolled out.

Disability numbers Skyrocketed! Prior to the Covid-19 shots there were 29 to 30 million disabled people on an absolute basis, a rate that remained steady for four or five years. In 2021, a trend changed. Disabilities reached a high of 33.2 million in September of 2022, with numbers trending upward. This trend of change that is happening is highly unusual.

Insurance companies that sell group life policies to large Fortune 500 corporations have seen a 40% surge in deaths. These companies thrive on selling policies to these types of companies because they hardly ever pay out on a claim. The workers at these corporations tend to be in good health, with industry data suggesting the group life policyholders have one-third the mortality rate of the general U.S. population. These death rates have historically been highly predictable among this group.

Steve Kirsch also provided insight to this article. Kirsch wrote, the data showing among the vaccinated with the Covid-19 shot aged 65 and younger, sudden death was the No.1 cause of death in 2021 and 2022. The second highest cause of death was cardiac-related death and cancer was the third. The incidence of turbo-charged cancer among the vaccinated was significant in this group and myocarditis has killed more people than Covid-19. No myocarditis deaths were seen among unvaccinated people in the same age group.

Health Officials have previously stated that roughly 40% of the patients were admitted for Covid-19 related issues while the rest were admitted for other medical reasons but tested positive while at the hospital.

This works out to be out of the 1,205 Covid-19 positive patients **482 were admitted for Covid-19 related issues** and **723 of the 1,205 patients were admitted for other medical reasons** and later tested positive for Covid-19 while already being admitted into the hospital. Fox 11 News reported a total of 4,744 new Covid-19 cases.

This breaks down to **453 out of 1,132 are admitted for Covid-19 related issues** while **679 of the 1,132 were admitted for other medical reasons**, later testing positive for Covid-19 while already being admitted. The Los Angeles Department of Health also reported **10 additional deaths associated with Covid-19**.

822 Covid-19 positive patients were reported in L.A. County hospitals, 96 of the 822 were admitted into the ICU, which was down from 101 the previous day. My News L.A. reported that Health Officials have said previously that roughly 40% of the virus patients were admitted to the hospital for Covid-19 related issues, while the rest were admitted for other reasons but tested positive for Covid-19 while at the hospital. 329 of the 822 were admitted for Covid-19 related issues, while 493 of the 822 were admitted for other medical reasons, later testing positive for Covid-19 while at the hospital.

11/23/2022, My News L.A. reported the number of new positive Covid-19 patients being treated in L.A. County hospitals is 727. My News L.A. reported the number of statewide Covid positive patients is 2,581.

The County Department of Public Health reported per My News L.A. **1,661 new Covid-19 infections and the County reported 7 new “virus” related deaths. My News L.A. did not distinguish what these new “virus” related deaths were (Covid-19, RSV or Influenza).** Health Officials have said, roughly 40% of the virus patients were admitted for Covid-related issues, while the rest were admitted for other reasons later testing positive for Covid-19 at the hospital. This breaks down to **291 out of the 727 were admitted for Covid-19 related issues and 436 of the 727 were admitted for other medical reasons, later testing positive while already being admitted at the hospital.**

11/20/2022, My News L.A. reported that the number of positive Covid-19 cases inside L.A. County Hospitals has increased by (4) bringing the number to 670. The latest figures come as local Health Officials are reporting 2,200 new cases and 8 “Virus-related” deaths. It wasn’t distinguished what these “virus-related” deaths were (Influenza, RSV or Covid-19).

New Covid-19 admissions per 9.83 million 670 or 0.0068%

Death Rate per 9.83 million 8 or 0.0000814%

11/17/2022, CBS L.A. news reported, County Health Officials, “Strongly recommending” indoor masking with Covid-19 cases on the rise. 1,949 new infections were reported but did not distinguish what these infections were. (Influenza, RSV or Covid-19 infections?). The number of Covid-19 positive patients in County

hospitals rose to 648. Per CBS LA news, roughly 40% of those patients are admitted because of Covid-19 infections, while the rest were admitted for other medical reasons, later testing positive for Covid-19 while already admitted. That breaks down to, 648 patients admitted to County hospitals, 259 of the 648 were admitted because of Covid-19 infections and 389 of the 648 patients were admitted to the hospital for other medical reasons, later testing positive for Covid-19.

11/16/2022, My News L.A. reported, the number of Covid-19 positive cases in L.A. County hospitals continued to rise, according to the latest data. 552 Covid-19 positive patients have been hospitalized. 75 of the 552 were being treated in the ICU. Health officials have said previously that roughly 40% of the patients were admitted for Covid-19 related issues, while the rest were admitted for other reasons but later tested positive at the hospital. This breaks down to 221 of the 552 were admitted for Covid-19 related issues, and 331 of the 552 were admitted into the hospital for other reasons, later testing positive for Covid-19. L.A. County reported 1,532 Covid-19 positives cases and 10 reported Covid-19 deaths.

Hospitalizations rates for influenza haven't been this high, this early since 2009 Swine Flu pandemic. KTLA reported there is an estimate of 1300 Flu deaths in L.A. County. Flu activity has spiked over the past month.

11/10/2022, My News L.A. reported the number of Covid-19 positive patients in L.A. County hospitals increased by 52, bringing the total to 492 patients admitted to the hospital. 43 of the 52 admitted patients were admitted into the I.C.U. which was down by 10 from the previous day. L.A. County reported a total of 1,662 new cases.

My News LA reported the statewide total of Covid-19 positive patients, rose by 99, bringing the total to 1,855 cases.

New Covid-19 admissions per 9.83 million population 492 or 0.0050%

State Covid-19 Admissions per 39.24 million population 1,855 or 0.0047%

I can only speculate that **if vaccination status were provided in the above reports, it would likely mirror the current data** the LAPD has provided. The **vaccinated would-be overwhelming majority of the new positive Covid-19 infections / admissions.**

Australian Public Health data finds ALL the 1,779 Covid related hospitalizations and ICU admissions were all vaccinated. The total Covid-19 deaths, 6.3% of those were unvaccinated, leaving 93.6% of the deaths being vaccinated. Same Covid-19 virus, same gene therapy shot.

I have included my public comment below for November 1, 2022. I find it very bizarre that all public comments for 11/01/22 are not able to be viewed in the archives on your web page. In event the files somehow got corrupted, and you are not able to post the public comments. This public comment is detailed and clearly defines the Covid-19 trends at that time, conflicting with what Commissioner Briggs informed the public on 9/20/22 and 10/25/2022.

11/01/2022

Hello everyone, as always, I hope you all are doing well. Based on Chief Moore's Covid-19 reports year to date **(January 11, 2022 – October 25, 2022)** the vaccinated are making up **76%** of the infections within your department. In the month of October, Chief Moore reported a total of **58 Covid-19 infections** within the LAPD. **The vaccinated made up 42 of the 58 total infections, 72% of the infections** were from the vaccinated population within the LAPD for the month of October.

Based on the CDC indicators and thresholds, on **9/2/2022, the CDC moved LA County into the low Community level** for severe illness from Covid-19. Reflecting minimal stress on the hospital systems in LA County associated with Covid-19. Per the CDC many people in the U.S. have some protection, or immunity, against Covid-19. This immunity, combined with the availability of tests and treatments, has greatly reduced the risk of severe illness, hospitalizations, and death from the Covid-19 for many people.

As leaders of the C.O.L.A. it is important to stay up on current trends. Let me be a little clearer as what I'm speaking of, on **9/20/2022, (18 days after the CDC published their report)** Commissioner Briggs **advised that the state of emergency remain active because of increased covid cases, increased hospitalizations and death, Briggs further added that these cases have increased from one month prior and continue to pose an imminent risk to health.** This was the **verbiage that he used on 08/23/2022** to extend the emergency as well.

On **10/25/2022** Commissioner Briggs continues to read this same verbiage from his computer screen to extend the state of emergency. **Commissioner Briggs, I'm going to make a formal request, that you provide your source of where you are getting this data from and provide it to the public.**

Let's compare what Commissioner Briggs said to what the CDC has published for L.A. County for Covid-19 numbers.

The CDC publishes new Covid-19 data every Thursday, you can even access what area you want to search. I simply type Covid Tracker in the search bar, **which brings you to a secured CDC website** and then enter Los Angeles County for the area that I want to search. **I would encourage the Police Commission and Chief Moore to do your own research along with checking the dates on the data that you are receiving before disseminating to the public.**

My question to every one of you is this, based on the data that Chief Moore has provided on Agenda item #1 and the data from the CDC on Covid, why is the city of Los Angeles proceeding forward with this Covid-19 mandate? I know this has been asked several times in the past, but it has never been answered. Being vaccinated does not prevent an individual from contracting or transmitting Covid-19.
