LAPD POLICE Commission, LAPD Chief Choi, the LAPD and Public,

During the Report of the Chief of Police at the 4/13/24 Police Commission meeting two major incidents in Los Angeles were not reported on by Chief Dominic Choi. I refer to the murder of Mirna Soza, a 66 year old Security Guard commuting on her way home on the subway after an overnight shift and the second intrusion upon the official residence of the Mayor of Los Angeles while she was home.

Are not these two incidents of great significance? The Chief did not provide any information on the horrific and tragic murder of Mirna until he was asked about the incident by a Police Commissioner! Has violent crime and murder become so commonplace in Los Angeles that the Chief doesnt report on it in his report? All lives matter and all homicides should be reported on in our city!

Security on the MTA subway system has been an ongoing major concern for the public and needs to be addressed in detail with a plan that the public is aware of! Knowing the extensive criminal history of the murderer, it is clear that the criminal injustice system has blood on its hands! This is another case of our criminal justice system not protecting the law abiding public from habitual violent offenders who have no regard for human life. Unfortunately, Mirna, a working security guard, was not armed. If she had been she might have been able to save her own life.

The suspect had been arrested for a violent assault as recent as February of this year on or near the same MTA location and instead of being in jail awaiting a preliminary hearing and legal proceedings , the violent criminal was free to assault the public again and this time Mirna was the victim of murder! We offer prayers and condolences to Mirna and her family.

Regarding the Mayors residence home invasion intrusion. Was that not a serious significant incident? Did the Mayor order Chief Choi not to comment on this incident or the murder of Mirna? What possible explanation is there for the omission of two serious significant incidents? Whoever is preparing the Chief's report has to do a better

job at providing a complete, thorough Chiefs report that address the concerns of the public!

Communication is key and we, the People, deserve better! The Chief and Police Commission must lead by example and create a police public partnership with communicating, educating, protecting and serving being the priorities!
