Last week we all witnessed multiple disruptions at the Police Commission by the usual suspects, despite being warned again by Police Commission President Briggs in a reminder that only one meeting disruption warning would be provided and disruption would not be tolerated. Yet, the meeting was disrupted again multiple times and multiple warnings were given with just an escort of the disruptors out of the meeting done after much hesitation by both President Briggs and the Sgt at Arms.

The usual disruptors clearly do not respect the decorum, rules and protocols of the Police Commission Meeting nor do they consider the rights of others who attend to participate in public comment. I have monitored the public comment and the disruptions do take away time from other citizens who take the time to que in public chat patiently waiting for time to speak.

It is time for order to be restored to the meeting. We are calling upon LAPD Chief Moore and the Police Commission to direct the arrest of malicious meeting disruptors by the Sgt of Arms and LAPD officers assigned to the meeting for 403 P.C. Disrupting a Public Meeting which is a misdemeanor.

As a citizen of Los Angeles District 10 I'm writing to submit public comments to the LA Police Commission meeting. I'm also cc-ing the city council members since the commission continuously fails to hold LAPD accountable and continues to not heed the majority of public comments given.

Agenda Item 3A

As a citizen I reject all donations to LAPD of military equipment and other technology such as lasers and surveillance tools. LAPD does not need more tools to harm Angelenos or to prop up its operations under the guise of "increasing crime." LAPD continues to accept donations as a way to avoid city budgeting regulations. Stop letting them have more tools that harm.

General Public Comment: General Public Comment Limitations

Stop removing protestors from your meetings! Remove the public comment time limitation! Re-arrange meeting order so that participants may comment on items being voted on by the Board after hearing any discussion and presentation.

General Public Comment: No on Robot Dog

I'm asking that you totally reject LAPD gaining and using the Boston Dynamics Quadruped Unmanned Surveillance Robot named SPOT. The City Council and Police Commission already fail to hold LAPD accountable, merely giving them more money each year despite their continued violence on the community which has included killing of those with mental health struggles, exploding fireworks in a South LA neighborhood, harming protestors, sexual abuse within the police department, and so much more.

When you fail to hold LAPD accountable, why would we the community trust them to have a robot dog that can further surveillance our communities? The robot dog will perpetuate what LAPD and SWAT already does with drone technology. Over one-third of instances of drone use by SWAT were in the predominantly Black and Brown communities policed by 77th Division, 11.9 square miles of land already heavily occupied and surveilled by police from the ground and air. These are the communities where LAPD wants to keep using drones, and experiment with quadruped unmanned robotic devices like SPOT as well.

More disturbing news about LAPD has surfaced that shows more unsurprising proof about LAPD's SWAT "Mafia" and their culture of violence.

LAPD DOES NOT NEED A ROBOT DOG. No matter what excuses LAPD gives for gaining a robot dog or other military technology, we cannot trust LAPD. LAPD has shown us time and time again we cannot trust them. I don't know why you still do.

Specifically LAPD SWAT MAFIA DOES NOT NEED A ROBOT DOG.

Good morning, Police Commissioners, I hope everyone is doing well. Before I begin, I want to start with a quote from Stephen Covey, **“If you want to be trusted, be trustworthy.”**

Commissioner Briggs & City Councilmembers where is the transparency that you all speak about? We have asked on several occasions and you have not provided an explanation for your actions. Why did you provide the public with false information to extend the state of emergency? We are aware the City of Los Angeles received financial support every time you extended the state of emergency. The conditions must first be met to declare the state of emergency and when conditions are not met and you declare they are and receive a financial incentive, this is a textbook example of FRAUD! The Police Commission extended the state of emergency to continue to allow for virtual meetings under a false pretense, however City Council extended the state of emergency for profit, under a false pretense. When you follow in the same footsteps of former City Councilmembers Ridley-Thomas, Englander, Huizar, Alarcon sooner or later you are bound to reach the same destiny.

The days of "Cashing that check" for personal gain and paying to play need to end!

The below timeline contradicts the rationale you all used to extend the state of emergency.

On 9/2/2022, the CDC moved LA County into the low Community level for severe illness from Covid-19. Reflecting minimal stress on the hospital systems in LA County associated with Covid-19. Per the CDC many people in the U.S. have some protection, or immunity, against Covid-19. This immunity, combined with the availability of

tests and treatments, has greatly reduced the risk of severe illness, hospitalizations, and death from the Covid-19 for many people.

On **9/20/2022**, During agenda item #3 AB361, Commissioner Briggs advised, the **state of emergency remain active because of increased Covid cases, increased hospitalizations, and death**. These cases have **increased from one month prior and continue to pose an imminent risk to health**. Commissioner **Briggs used data from the L.A. County Health Department from July 7, 2022**. The CDC published updated Covid-19 data eighteen days prior to this Police Commission meeting. Commission Briggs was not providing the public with the current trends.

On **October 17, 2022**, Governor Newsom published a report from his official webpage, noting hospitalizations and deaths are dramatically reduced and California has the tools needed to continue fighting Covid-19. Governor Newsom even added he has built up an unprecedented public health infrastructure.

On **October 25, 2022**, Commissioner Briggs during the Police Commission meeting **read from his computer screen the same verbiage as he did on 9/20/22 to extend the state of emergency, using data from the L.A. County Health Department from July 7, 2022**. As you can see from the CDC and what was posted on the official webpage from Governor Newsom there is a wide discrepancy with the verbiage Commissioner Briggs used.

I did point this out in my public comment for November 1, 2022, for some odd reason my public comment along with many others have been inaccessible to view on your webpage for months. It wasn't until April 25, 2023, it was brought back online for the public to view after you were caught and were called out that you didn't allow access to these public comments.

I feel that it's very important for all to know, the City of Los Angeles received over 2.8 billion dollars from the U.S Government to engineer a Covid mandate in the name of public safety. If the City of Los Angeles decommissions this mandate #187134 prior to May 11, 2023, the City of Los Angeles is responsible for paying back all the money received from the U.S. Government. We would really like your feedback on how effective this mandate has worked for public safety. The data that you have provided to the public is a good indicator.
