



Commendable Officer and Citizen Incidents by Basic Car

On **November 7, 2023**, Officer Aguilar #43073 and Officer Salguero #42558 were working 77th Gang Enforcement Detail. Officers were conducting crime suppression in the area of Crenshaw and Slauson. Within the past 3 months there has been an uptake of numerous Rollin 60's/ Van Ness Gangster loitering in the area of 54Th and 3rd Avenue. This loitering has become a serious problem for the local residents. While officers were driving westbound on 54Th Street, they observed a known Rollin 60 gang member with an outstanding warrant. As officers approached the suspect, he immediately ran away from the officers while holding his waist band. Officers gave chase and observed the suspect toss a black metal object resembling an unknown type of handgun. Officers caught the suspect two blocks from his original location and recovered a fully loaded firearm. Good job by the officers paying close attention to detail. Thanks to these officers, another weapon was removed off the street of Los Angeles.

Holiday Safety and Crime Prevention Tips

Facts and Figures:

- A Security.org survey noted that 49 millions Americans (nearly 19%) have had at least one package stolen in the past twelve months.¹
- 36% of U.S. adults surveyed say they've sent a package somewhere other than their home address, 54% say they've changed plans in order to receive a package in person, and nearly seven in 10 said they weren't willing to change up their online holiday shopping habits in the face of package theft.³

General Holiday Safety and Crime Prevention Tips

(Courtesy of the Knoxville Police Department)

- At Home
 - o Make sure all doors and windows have secondary locks (window pins, deadbolts, dowels, etc.) and use them!
 - o Don't hide spare keys in mailboxes or planters, or under doormats.
 - o Ensure that dark areas and entrances have outdoor lights that are turned on after dark or are activated by sensors.
 - o Keep trees and shrubbery trimmed so they do not conceal doors and windows. Remember, overgrown foliage can provide a hiding place for criminals.
 - o Place gifts where they can't be seen from the outside.
 - o Consider safe deposit boxes for coin and stamp collections, seldom-worn jewelry, stock bonds, etc.
 - o Be sure to mail cards, checks or gift certificates from the Post Office or at a blue U.S. Postal Service collection box.
 - o Lock your vehicle and remove all the valuables. Yes, even in your driveway.

- • Strangers at your Door o Use caution anytime there is a stranger at your door.
 - o Be suspicious of unexpected sales calls or deliveries. Ask for identification.
 - o Be aware of scams that criminals commit to take advantage of people's generosity during the holidays.
 - o Investigate charities before making donations. Ask how the funds will be used.
 -
 - • Leaving for the Holidays o Ask a trusted friend, neighbor or Neighborhood Watch member to watch your home.
 - o Use timers for lights and radios while you're away.
 - o Remember to make arrangements for mail and newspapers.
 -
 - • After the Holidays o Don't advertise expensive toys, electronics, or other gifts received by the boxes left for garbage collections. Compress large boxes and place them in black garbage bags for pick-up.
1. o Add new items to your home inventory. Take photos or video of all items of value in your home and list each item's make, model, serial number and other information.
 2. o Engrave new items to help identify them in the event they are stolen.

Commendable Officer and Citizen Incidents by Basic Car

On **November 14, 2023**, at approximately 0325 hours, Officer Gomez and Officer Moorhead were conducting extra patrol in the area of Florence and Figueroa. They drove into the McDonald's parking lot, when they observed a black Mercedes Benz, with the engine running, backed into a parking lot. The officers utilized their flashlight to illuminate the inside of the vehicle and observed a male (Later identified as the suspect) asleep on the driver seat of the vehicle. The suspect was the only sole occupant of the vehicle. The officers approached the vehicle and observed a semi-automatic pistol in the front waistband of the suspect's pants. The officers redeployed and requested additional resources. The suspect woke up and was startled to see the officers. The suspect began to make furtive movements towards the floorboard. The officers ordered the suspect out of the vehicle and took him into custody without incident. Officers recovered a semi-automatic firearm underneath the driver's seat. The firearm was loaded with one round in the chamber and eight live rounds in the magazine. The suspect was arrested for possession of a loaded firearm.

On **November 3, 2023**, Officers Kumlander and Duarte received what most would consider to be a routine call for service. The radio call was for a family dispute with the comments stating that there was a suspect being verbally aggressive. Officers responded to the call and met with the person reporting. Soon thereafter, officers observed the suspect and recognized several of his tattoos as being associated with a local violent street gang. Officers used this knowledge and their experience to use extra caution with the suspect. The suspect was detained without incident and a loaded handgun was recovered from the couch where the suspect was seated. These officers did not stop there. Utilizing additional investigative skills and requesting additional resources to the scene, officers were also able to recover a loaded submachine gun.

A huge thank you to the 911 caller and to the thoroughness of Officers Kumlander and Duarte for removing this violent criminal and two illegal firearms from our streets. It is cooperation like this that provides our community with a safer neighborhood for all.

On November 13, 2023, at approximately 2300 hours, Officers Estrada #44824 and Gutierrez #41495, assigned to 77th Patrol, were conducting extra patrol in the area of Victoria Ave and 67th St. This area is a Cul-De-Sac where Suspects are known to dump stolen vehicles.

On this day, officers observed an occupied White Kia Optima parked at the location and missing its front and rear plates (common tactic used by Suspects). Due to the high theft of Kia vehicles in the area, Officers conducted a thorough investigation and uncovered that the car was reported stolen in the early morning hours of November 13, 2023.

The vehicle was located and recovered, in less than 24 hours, because of the Officers productivity and knowledge of area.

Commendable Officer and Citizen Incidents

On **November 20, 2023**, at approximately 2315 hours, Officer Jaramillo #35692 and his partner Officer Duarte #45468, were working 77th patrol, in full uniform, assigned 12A53 Watch 3. They were driving around the area of 83rd St and Vermont conducting extra patrol. This area is a known area for stolen vehicles and recovered stolen vehicles. Officer Jaramillo (Senior Training Officer) along with various probationary officers throughout this year have made approximately 25 GTA arrest YTD.

Officers were checking the area when they observed a white Toyota Tundra parked awkwardly along the curb with its engine running. Officers conducted a want/warrant check on the license plate and received a return indicating it belonged to a 2004 Chevrolet. Officers verified the vehicle in question, which was a Toyota Tundra, and not a Chevy. Officers followed the vehicle and at one point the suspect attempted to wave at the officers to go around him. Officers remained behind the suspect's vehicle and requested a back-up, air unit, and supervisor. Officers followed the suspect for a short distance until other resources arrived. Once everyone was set officers activated their overhead lights and the suspect pulled over in the area of 79th St and Vermont. Suspect was taken into custody without incident. A check of the vehicle revealed the ignition was punched. The vehicle had been reported stolen out of southeast division.

During a pat down search of the suspect, officers found him in possession of various other car keys. Not one key he had in his possession fit any type of Toyota vehicle. The suspect was transported back to 77th station and booked for GTA. Officers contacted the registered owner and advised him their vehicle had been found. He was very appreciative and thanked the officers.

This month there has been an increase in stolen vehicles (KIA) (Hyundai). Be aware of where you park and always lock and secure your vehicles. It is important to have an audible anti-theft mechanism on your vehicle and if you park in front of your home, please install cameras which offer the proper coverage. It is a small price to pay to protect your property and avoid being victimized. Please remember to utilize the 311 APP, download on your phone. It has several requests that can be made from bulky items pickup, homeless encampments, and graffiti removal.

- 1: Avoid driving alone or at night.

On **November 4, 2023**, officers were conducting extra patrol in the area of 82nd Street and Broadway when they observed a known gang member who they were advised lived in the area and was on active parole with an outstanding warrant for violation of parole. Upon seeing the officers, the individual quickly walked away and into the rear residence of the location. Officers made contact with the resident of the home located in the front of the property. The resident advised that the property to the rear was vacant and that no one should be living in it. Officers entered the residence to make sure it was clear and found the suspect hiding under a bed. During their search for possible additional suspects, the officers observed and recovered a firearm inside a drawer. The officers further observed photos of the suspect inside the residence along with several gang paraphernalia inside. Officers arrested the suspect for Felon with a Firearm and his outstanding warrant. Officers are to be commended for their observation skills and their dedication to keeping dangerous felons off the street. Great job to all involved!

On **November 16, 2023**, Officers conducting extra patrol in the area of Manchester and San Pedro observed a stolen vehicle with occupants in it. Driving

- Avoid driving alone or at night.
- Keep all car doors locked and windows closed while in or out of your car. Set your alarm or use an anti-theft device.
- If you must shop at night, park in a well-lighted area.
- Avoid parking next to vans, trucks with camper shells, or cars with tinted windows.
- Park as close as you can to your destination and take notice of where you parked.
- Never leave your car unoccupied with the motor running or with children inside.
- Do not leave packages or valuables on the seat of your car. This creates a temptation for thieves. If you must leave something in the car, lock it in the trunk or put it out of sight.
- Be sure to locate your keys prior to going to your car.
- Keep a secure hold on your purse, handbag and parcels. Do not put them down or on top of the car in order to open the door.
- When approaching or leaving your vehicle, be aware of your surroundings.
- Do not approach your car alone if there are suspicious people in the area.
- Ask mall or store security for an escort before leaving your shopping location.

Commendable Officer and Citizen Incidents by Basic Car

On **November 2, 2023**, Gang Officer Mendoza #40867, and his partner Officer Lee #43252 were conducting patrol in Rollin 90's gang territory due to recent shootings over the summer. During their patrol they observed a black BMW traveling westbound 104th street at a high rate of speed. Officers were able to catch up to the vehicle when it abruptly stopped in front of 1444 W. 105th Street, a known Rollin 100's gang location.

Officers observed a male exit the rear driver's side door and immediately grabbed his front hoodie pocket with both hands. Moments later the male ran towards the rear of the apartment complex. Officers went in foot pursuit after the male and set up a perimeter around the apartment complex. Officers observed the male reappear and followed officer Lee's commands. The male suspect was taken into custody without incident. During the search, a stainless-steel revolver handgun was recovered in the grass where the suspect was last seen.

Officers are to be commended for their teamwork, and investigative skills that resulted in the apprehension of an armed suspect.



WCRP is a forensic program that provides a comprehensive approach to meet the needs of formerly incarcerated women who live with mental illness and co-occurring substance abuse issues.

Program Goals & Objectives

The primary goal of WCRP is to assist women who have been incarcerated and involved in the justice system to reintegrate and become successful members of their communities.

WCRP believes that providing mental health treatment, peer support, employment and/or educational opportunities while strengthening family/social connections will aid in recovery and foster progress towards one's life goals.

Services Offered

Mental Health Treatment

- Individual therapy and trauma informed care
- Group rehabilitation* (including anger management, motivation to change, healthy relationships, domestic violence, parenting and seeking safety for trauma)
- Court approved classes

Medication Management

- Psychiatry, and psychiatric nursing services (in the office and in the field)

Case Management

- Assistance locating and collaborating with housing providers to link with temporary and permanent housing available.
- Assistance with obtaining social security benefits
- Additional vocational/educational programs and employment assistance
- Linking to community resources

Eligibility Criteria

Focal population must meet the following criteria:

1. Adult women, ages 18 years and older; all women and gender diverse individuals.
2. A history of LA County Sheriff and/or California Department of Corrections incarceration within the last 12 months.
3. 1 adult conviction and currently in pre-sentencing phase.
4. Diagnosed with a DSM-5 mental health disorder which creates a functional impairment in a social setting (such as work and/or educational environments)

A safer community begins with you.

The Los Angeles Regional Crime Stoppers program is a community-based, non-profit organization that offers an anonymous way to report crimes. Through the Crime Stoppers program, you can send a web-based tip, send a tip through the mobile app, or call anonymously and the information will be sent directly to law enforcement. Only the tip information will be asked, and you don't have to identify yourself. You will be asked to provide as much detail as possible to enable law enforcement to investigate. If your information leads to an arrest, you may be eligible for a reward up to \$1,000. Your phone number and computer IP address will not be traced.
