Help Us PREVENT TERRORISM - "See Something, Report to iWATCH"

iWatch is a community program and partnership between the public and Los Angeles Police Department. The program educates the community regarding possible acts of terrorism by teaching them about behaviors and activities that appear unusual and/or seem to be out of the ordinary, makes them aware of important places to watch, and informs them on key details that should be included as part of the reporting process.

Basic Car 9A5 Officer Brian Franco here. The Los Angeles Police Department is committed to ensuring the safety of the citizens in our community. Impairment, speeding, street racing, and other dangerous driving behaviors jeopardize the safety of other people on the road. We continue to enforce traffic laws with the goal of reducing collisions, educating the citizens in our community, and keeping our community safe. This is achieved through the establishment of preventative patrols to manage specific categories of unlawful driving behavior. Traffic enforcement strategies are based on collision data, enforcement activity records, traffic volume, and traffic conditions. Several methods contribute to our overall goal: arrests, citations, warnings, and education. Through these methods and efforts, we strive to educate our community on the importance of safe driving and we aim to keep our community safe.

Recently, the bus lane was added to Sepulveda Blvd in our area. The scheme, originally introduced on 1 November 2024, aims to improve public transport efficiency and ease congestion on key routes. Traffic congestion on local streets steals valuable time and creates safety issues for all street users, particularly those taking public transit to get to and from home, work, school, businesses, and other key locations. Anyone seen driving the designated bus lane will be cited under, 22650 (a) VC. Which states, a person shall not operate a motor vehicle on a portion of a highway that has been designated for the exclusive use of public transit buses, except in compliance with the directions of a peace officer or official traffic control device.

L.A. Metro says the initiative is part of its ongoing efforts to improve safety and ensure equitable access, as well as enhancing the reliability and speed of bus services, particularly along high-traffic corridors where bus lanes are critical to keeping buses on time. The agency notes blocking bus lanes has a disproportionate impact on bus riders, resulting in delays and disruptions. One vehicle can have an outsized burden on the dozens of riders on each bus, resulting in missed transfers and late arrivals. In addition, for those passengers with mobility challenges, it impacts their ability to easily enter or exit the bus. As a result, violators parked in bus lanes will face a penalty starting at \$293 for illegally parking in designated bus lanes, helping to ensure buses can travel without obstruction and reduce delays for passengers.

So please respect our new designated bus lanes as thousands of Angelenos depend on public transit to get to their jobs, schools, healthcare and other critical destinations.

Greetings residents and business owners of Basic Car 9A19! Recently we have received several calls from leaders of various car clubs asking "permission" to bring back the Van Nuys Blvd. Cruiser Night events. As you know these unsanctioned events bring thousands of people into Van Nuys Division causing traffic gridlock, noise, and communal blight. The Van Nuys Area Senior Lead Officers have managed to curb these events since April 2024 with zero-tolerance enforcement. The Los Angeles Police Department will not grant permission for any Cruiser Night Events. If the various car clubs choose to hold an unsanctioned event, a zero-tolerance enforcement action will be taken. This includes Vehicle Code, and Los Angeles Municipal Code Violations. In addition, spectators, participants and leaders hosting the event may also be issued an Administrative Citation (ACE) with stiff monetary penalties.

Neighborhood Watch! On March 8, 2025 a neighborhood watch meeting was held at 6753 Katherine Ave. with the Katherine Circle Group. Fifty-seven residents were in attendance and we discussed the recently rise in burglary related crimes. Neighborhood Watch meetings is a great opportunity to meet your Senior Lead Officer, get updated crime statistics and crime trends and interact with your neighbors. Hello basic car 9A41, as the weather becomes warmer and more people begin to have private gatherings again it is important to remember the laws pertaining to such gatherings. Pursuant to Los Angles Municipal Code (LAMC) Section 41.58.1, Loud or Unruly Conduct, violators can be subject to punishment or fines ranging from \$100-\$8,000.

A Loud or Unruly Gathering is defined by the Los Angeles City Council Ordinance No. 185451, as: "A gathering of persons at any residence where loud or unruly conduct occurs at the residence of within 500 feet of the residence, and which threatens or interferes with the public health, safety, or welfare, or the comfortable enjoyment of life and property."

To report Loud Gatherings or Unruly Gatherings call the non-emergency number at 1-877-ASK LAPD. Every time a call is created, it creates an incident number that can be referenced later for additional fines or penalties. Also contact your Senior Lead Officer about the activity so that they are aware of the activity. Lastly, LAMC Code 41.58 does not have a time frame and applies to all hours of the day and night. Depending on the call load it may take officers some time to respond so call immediately when the activity begins.

Lastly, Homeless encampments have been a concern for many residents and businesses. I have been working closely and very diligently with the Urban Alchemy CIRCLE team, Sanitation, and the Council Districts Field Deputies. I want to remind everyone that it is a group effort to help keep our streets clean. If you see any area that has bulky items left (furniture, mattresses etc.), please utilize the **MYLA311** app. This app is a free download, and very easy to use. Please provide as many details as possible to ensure that the appropriate resources are sent to provide the needed services. This will help prevent the items being used by the homeless as their furniture.

Greetings Sherman Oaks,

According to the City of Los Angeles' party house ordinance, an unlawful party is a "loud or unruly gathering," which is defined by:

- Loud noise (audible 150 feet from the property line)
- Obstruction of a street or public right-of-way, including a sidewalk
- Public intoxication or drinking in public
- The service of alcoholic beverages to minors
- Possession and/or consumption of alcohol by minors
- Assault, battery, fights, domestic violence or other disturbances of the peace
- The sale or service of alcoholic beverages without a required license
- Vandalism or destruction of property
- Litter, urinating or defecating in public
- Trespassing

In the event of an unlawful party in your neighborhood, it is imperative of you to officially document this nuisance. The most effective way to document these incidents is by calling 1-877-275-5273. Remember, you can remain anonymous. If you wish for a call back from the dispatched officer, please advise the police dispatcher.

Secondly, contact your Senior Lead Officer. Your Senior Lead Officer will then work with the Los Angeles City Attorney Community Law Corps ("CLC"). The CLC is comprised of attorneys and legal professionals with years of experience in civil and criminal law. The CLC takes preventative and proactive measures to address a variety of issues that affect neighborhoods and establishes partnerships to resolve problems that enforcement, alone, cannot adequately address.

Basic Car 9A89 covers the southern portion of Sherman Oaks and a small portion of Studio City.

Home Burglaries Physical Protection Measures:

- Install single cylinder dead-bolt locks on all exterior doors. Bolts should have a minimum throw of 1 inch Strike plates should have screws that are at least 3 inches long. Doors should be solid hardwood or metal clad. Hinges should be located on the inside or have non-removable pins. Special locks are needed on double doors. Install additional locking devices on all sliding glass doors and windows.
- Chain locks are only good for privacy, not security.
- Re-key or change all locks when moving into a new home.
- Install locks on gates, garages, sheds, etc.
- Contact a locksmith or hardware store for advice on locks.
- Reinforce the glass in windows on the lock sides of doors so a burglar cannot break them and reach in to open the door.
- Install a good side-yard gate and keep it locked at all times. Side and back entries are the most common access points for burglars.
- Plant bushes with thorns or prickly leaves near windows and along fences.
- Trim trees so that limbs don't provide access to roofs, second stories, etc.

Deterrent Measures

- Attach Neighborhood Watch and/or Alarm Company stickers on or near entry doors and windows.
- Consider having a dog that can scare a stranger away by either barking or looking fierce.
- Keep an outside dog in a fenced area and have a good lock on the gate.
- Use fencing, gates, landscaping, pavement treatment, signs, etc. to define clear boundaries between your property and adjoining properties.
- Consider Installing a Home Alarm System That Provides 24/7 Monitoring Alarm systems usually include one or more of the following components:
- Magnetic contacts on doors and windows, heat or motion detectors in interior spaces, glass break detectors, keypads with a means of checking the status of the system, and audible alarms.
- Get alarm company references from friends or neighbors. If your system is monitored, make sure the monitoring station is open 24/7 and has backup power. The company's customer service department should also be open 24/7.
- Inform your insurance company. You may qualify for a discount.
- The system should also have a fail-safe battery backup. Check the batteries periodically and replace them if necessary.

Crime Prevention Tips

- IF YOU'RE HOME AND SOMEONE KNOCKS OR RINGS YOUR DOORBELL, DO NOT IGNORE IT. Would be burglars like to knock to determine if someone is home before attempting to break in. So, please make sure you verbally acknowledge the person without opening the door. If you have not invited someone to your home, you should not open the door for them.
- **SECURITY AND/OR DOOR BELL SYSTEMS WITH VIDEO** are becoming an affordable option to help reduce your chances of becoming a victim. Please consider these options to protect your home.
- **DON'T LEAVE YOUR KEYS IN YOUR VEHICLES.** Whether you are tandem parked, parked in a garage, or just going inside for a moment (i.e. gas station, your home, etc.), do not leave your keys in your vehicles.
- **STEERING WHEEL LOCKS**. 1990's Toyota's and Honda's are some of the most common vehicles stolen. These vehicles have door locks and ignitions that are easily compromised. Steering wheel locks are good tools to assist in deterring criminals from taking these vehicles.
- LOCK YOUR CAR AND PARK IT IN A GARAGE OR LIGHTED AREA. Make it difficult to get into your car. If it is outside, make your car as visible as possible. Do not leave anything valuable or visible in your vehicles.
- LOCK YOUR WINDOWS AND DOORS when you leave the house. Close your blinds/drapes so no one can see into your house. Keep every part of your residence locked and secured, including your garage. Strategic lighting can also assist with crime prevention.
- **DON'T LEAVE EXPENSIVE ITEMS OUT**, place them in a drawer, safe, or somewhere else out of sight.
- *TAKE YOUR ELECTRONIC ITEMS OUT OF YOUR CAR*, this includes your cell phones, computer tablets, other portable electronics, and chargers.
- **SHOPPING CART.** Do not leave your purses in the shopping cart while loading your vehicles.
